Scouting For Food

On Saturday, March 4th, Boy Scouts of all ages will be **Scouting For Food** in 31 counties across the Ozarks. For the 17th straight year, local Boy Scouts will distribute specially marked grocery bags provided by Price Cutter Supermarkets throughout local neighborhoods



to collect food for those less fortunate. If you find a bag on your door on March 4th, **please fill it with non-perishable foods** and hang it back on your door so the Boy Scouts can pick it up on the following **Saturday, March 11th**. All food collected will go to hunger relief agencies that exist within each county. In Greene County and the Springfield metro area, the donated food will go to Ozarks Food Harvest to distribute to local non-profit agencies. Last year, the Scouts collected over **16,000 pounds of food** within Greene County!

If you don't receive a Scouting for Food bag at your home, you can still **donate food by dropping it off at the Price Cutter Plus Store** located at Republic Road and Kansas Expressway on March 11th from 9:00 am to 2:00 pm, or at Ozarks Food Harvest any time during the week, or

from 9:00 am to 2:00 pm on Saturday the 11th. **Help our area Boy Scouts as they go Scouting for Food!**

2006 Feinstein Challenge

It's time for the annual **Feinstein Challenge!** The Feinstein Foundation offers \$1 million in funds each year to anti-hunger agencies like Ozarks Food Harvest. This money is divided between many different organizations, and the allocation is based on how much each participating organization raises. The more we raise between **March 1 and April 29**, the more money we will receive from the Feinstein Foundation. Since we can provide 143 pounds of food to people in our service area for only \$20, and that can feed a family of 4 for 10 days, you can see how much **every** dollar counts!

What can you do?

We need your help to feed even more hungry individuals in Southwest Missouri and North Central Arkansas this spring. We **challenge** all members of our community and local schools and businesses to get **involved**.

Since every dollar in donations we receive from **March 1 to April 29** counts for part of our Feinstein Challenge total this is the very best time of year to take advantage of the NAP program. St. John's Clinics

NAP Credit Participants

Thank you to everyone who participated in the NAP program, which not only helped feed many hungry people in the Ozarks, but also allowed you to earn

Missouri tax credits. The Neighborhood Assistance credits from the State of Missouri can only be used for charitable donations by businesses and those individuals who receive income reported on a K-1. Donors receive a tax credit of 50% of the value of their contribution, and needy families in the Ozarks receive food for their empty tables.

Check Out Hunger

Many home-town grocers helped us fight home-town hunger from November 14th – December 31, 2005. Check Out Hunger is a very important annual event for us, because it gives the community a chance to get involved in ending hunger in the Ozarks.

Full Circle Garden™

Our gardeners are often amazed by how much produce they can get from their plot in our community garden. Although they find it harder to grow the produce than to purchase it, they have reported that seeing the growth and fruit of their labor, and getting outside to work with their families is very gratifying.

We encourage the entire family to participate in our garden program, so in addition to free childcare for our gardeners during the cooking and nutrition classes, we offer special classes in which children can participate.

Full Circle Garden™ is not only a learning experience that can enrich the lives of the participants. It is also an opportunity for families to have fun and enjoy an enriching outdoor activity together. Best of all, our organic gardening techniques

Top Ten Ways to End Hunger

10. Volunteer:

- Your time can be as valuable as monetary or food donations. - Start a petition and get it signed by people you know and your community leaders, and then submit it to your congressman and local newspaper.

Agency Feature

La Trinidad-St. Luke United Methodist Church

In 2002, Hugo and Norma Villagrana of La Trinidad-St. Luke United Methodist Church found that many people in their community were in desperate need of assistance. “Our community wants to work hard, and it is difficult (for them) to ask for help or food,” said Hugo.

For the first 6 to 8 months of their ministry Hugo and Norma focused their efforts on social work; they helped people get jobs, doctor’s appointments and into school.

Hugo and Norma were helping the people in their community significantly, but by the winter of 2002-2003 they realized it wasn’t enough. The people they were helping needed more basic needs met as well.

The Villagranas went in search of more resources to help fill this need. They asked people in their church, and in other churches, for support. People started to make money and food donations, and then La Trinidad applied for Ozarks Food Harvest’s help. “In May of ‘03 we started the pantry, and Ozarks Food Harvest donated the refrigerator and freezer,” Hugo reported. La Trinidad receives about 30-35%

of their food from Ozarks Food Harvest, which is now the main resource for stocking the pantry that their community relies on for access to nourishment and assistance.

The Villagranas have found that many people in the Hispanic community have difficulty getting assistance because they don’t have social security cards or other paperwork required by many food service agencies. Because of this specific need, La Trinidad offers a lot of support to the Hispanic community, but their purpose is to serve the entire community. “We also serve the Anglo community. We do not judge,” Hugo told us. “We give out of love.”

Once people realized that La Trinidad didn’t require documents of its recipients and that they just wanted to help, Hugo found “the sense of shame,” that prevented some people from seeking help disappeared. Their pantry is open the 1st Saturday of each month from 9-2. While their space is small, and shelves sometimes empty, “always God provides.” Hugo said.

The people that come to the pantry only take what they need, and the same people often bring something back to donate. If Hugo or Norma notices a trend of the same people

Program Updates

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Makes our garden safe for even the youngest gardener.

Last year was the first year we were able to offer child care during our classes, which allowed more gardeners to complete the program. With your support we hope to continue to offer such a valuable resource to our gardening students.

We provide the gardeners who participate in the *Full Circle Garden™* program the seeds, plants, fertilizer, mulch, garden space, tools and training they need to produce an average of 125 pounds of fresh organic produce per garden plot, the size of which is determined by family size. In addition to showing the gardeners how to grow fresh produce, we teach them what nutritional benefits the produce they grow provides, how to prepare meals that include the food they have learned to grow for their families, and kitchen safety and proper food handling skills.

We would like to thank 1st and Calvary Church for providing cooking facilities for our varied classes during the planting and harvesting season, and also Baker Creek Heirloom Seeds, for the largest seed donation we've ever had! With your help we know this year's *Full Circle Garden™* program will be a success and help many people who often rely on food pantries for assistance gain access to fresh produce and greater self-sustainability.

If you would like to make a donation to *Full Circle Garden™*, **we really need: jars, pressure cookers, water bath canning pots, canning utensils, jar lifters, canning funnels, fence posts, plants, and hand tools for adults and children such as cultivators.** Of course, monetary donations are also

From the Executive Director

Whether you've resolved to exercise and lose weight, or give up a favorite food for Lent, this is the time of year many of us make "get healthy" promises to ourselves. (Nearly two-thirds of adults in the United States are overweight.)

While obesity is a problem that affects all segments of society, studies show that people who are food insecure are even more likely to be obese. One of the most frequent questions folks ask me is, "How can someone who is hungry be overweight?" There are many reasons for this phenomenon. People who don't have a consistent source of healthy food often binge when it becomes available. This is especially true for children of low income families, which often creates long-term unhealthy eating habits.

The next time you're in the grocery store, take a look at the prices of different foods. The cheapest foods are often the highest in sugar and fat, while fresh produce and lean meats are often the most expensive. People in poverty also tend to lack the knowledge and information necessary to make healthy food choices.

Ozarks Food Harvest works to address the problem of obesity among those in poverty with a focus on nutrition education and food distribution. Our *Full Circle Garden*™ program teaches adult participants and their families organic gardening techniques, nutrition, and recipes to help them include more fresh produce in their everyday diets. Our newest program, *Club F.U.N.* (Fitness, Understanding Health, and Nutrition) is a ten week nutrition and physical activity training program developed by our staff nutritionist that encourages healthy lifestyles and a decrease in childhood obesity. *This program was recently selected as the top child nutrition and fitness program among submissions from a ten state region by the USDA.* We also partner with member agencies to provide Kids Cafe® after school and summer meals for children of low income families.

Every month, over 35,000 people across the Ozarks will depend on us for access to healthy and nutritious food. Budget shortfalls at state and federal levels will place more responsibility with private charities like Ozarks Food Harvest to support these unfortunate individuals. Your support ensures that we continue to grow our long term commitment to a healthier, more productive community.

coming in, they will sometimes do a home visit to find out what their needs are. "They know we check on them because we care," said Hugo. They will also take food directly to the homes of those who need it, especially if the people won't ask for help themselves. Many of the people who initially required assistance are now helping others through volunteering and donations. "We are happy with this ministry. We can see how God works here," said Hugo.
